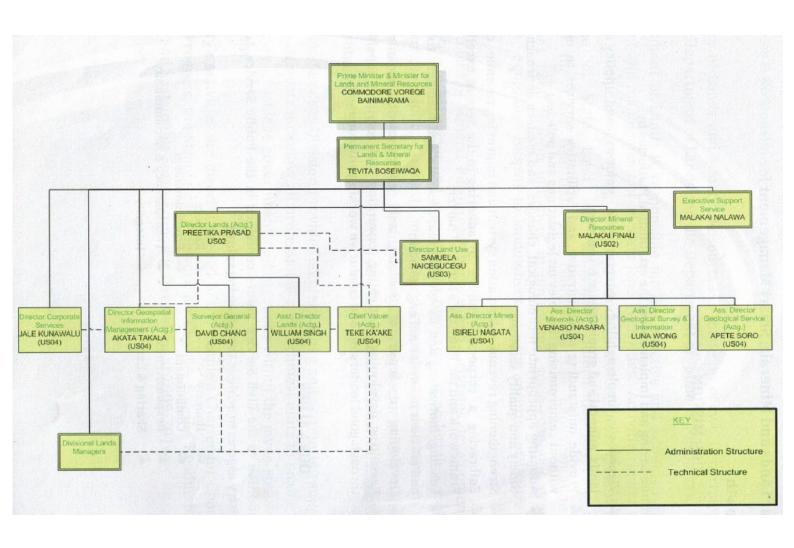

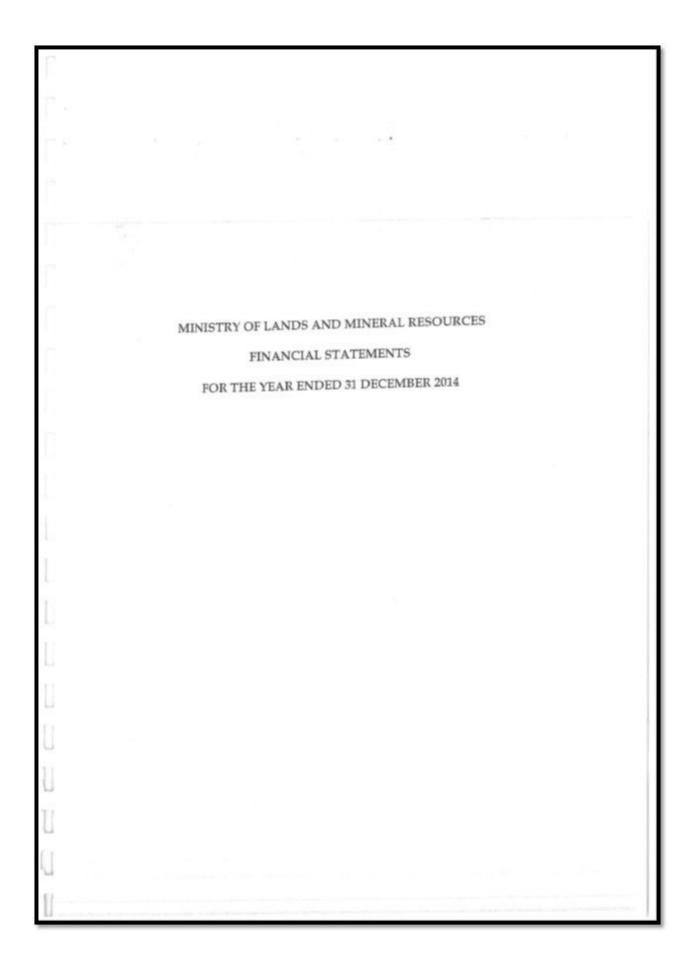

NOTE 1 REPORTING ENTITY

The Department of Lands & Survey is responsible for the administration, development and management of all State land property. Activities include Land Valuation, Surveys & Mapping, Development and Maintenance of State Land, Land Use and Geographical Information System.

The Department of Mineral Resources undertakes studies in relation to geological hazards, mineral prospects and ground water development and manage the development of the Mining and Quarrying sector with a mandate under the Mining, Petroleum (Exploration and Exploitation) Quarries, Explosives and Continental Shelf Acts.

NOTE 2 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Accounting

In accordance with Government accounting policies, the special purpose financial statements of the Ministry of Lands and Mineral Resources is prepared on cash basis of accounting. All payments related to purchases of fixed assets have been expensed.

The financial statements are presented in accordance with the Financial Management Act and the requirements of Section 71(1) of the Finance Instruction 2010. The preparation and presentation of a Statement of Assets and Liabilities is not required under the current Government policies.

b) Revenue Recognition

Revenues are recognized when funds are receipted by the Ministry of Lands and Mineral Resources.

c) Accounting for Value Added Tax (VAT)

All income and expenses are VAT exclusive. The Ministry on a monthly basis takes out VAT output on total money received for expenditure from Ministry of Finance. VAT input on the other hand is claimed on payments made to the suppliers and sub-contractors for expenses incurred.

The VAT payment as per the consolidated statement of receipts and expenditure relates to the VAT input claimed on payments made to the suppliers and sub-contractors for expenses incurred and VAT payments to FRCA. Actual amount paid to FRCA during the year represent the difference between VAT Output and VAT Input.

d) Comparative Figures

Where necessary, amounts relating to prior years have been reclassified to facilitate comparison and achieve consistency in disclosure with current year amounts.

NOTE 3 SIGNIFICANT VARIATIONS

- a. Land and Property Rent collections increased by \$1,034,590 or 8% due to the vigorous measures taken by the Ministry to collect the revenue and the arrears due to Government. Public Consultations held around the Country with Lessees in the last quarter and also encouraging payment to be facilitated through other Government agencies and Post Fiji also contributed to the increase.
- b. Fees Charges, Fines and Penalties increased by \$3,978,062 or 556% were mainly due to the increase in Lands & Survey Fees collected. The increase was also due to the increase in revenue collected such as Valuation Registration fees, Surveyor Registration fees, Royalties, Sand & Gravel fees and court fines.
- c. The Hire of Plant and Vehicles increased by \$8,623 or 544% was due to the increase in the hire of water & mineral drilling plants and machinery.
- d. License fees increased by \$70,181 or 98% due to increase in licenses issued by the Ministry during the year.
- e. Mining fees increased by \$96,767 or 18 % due to increase in new mining license issued by the Ministry and increase in renewal of mining license during the year.
- Stamp Duty fees decreased by \$130,016 or 53% as collection has been transferred to FRCA.
- g. Travel & Communication increased by \$214,392 or 43%due to the increase in cost involved in telecommunication, internal travelling of officers and allowances paid out.
- h. Maintenance and Operations decreased by \$2,343,743 or 30% due to the appropriate measures taken by the Ministry to ensure that budgetary provisions are utilised reasonably considering the best practices to procurement and expenditure is in proportion to output achieved.
- Capital Construction increased by \$3,094,722 or 208% due to the increase in provision for budgetary appropriation for SEG 8 and the increase in the number of projects executed during the period.
- Capital Grants and Transfers increased by \$541,783 or 126% due to the increase in payments executed for expenditures assigned under SEG 10.
- k. The increase in VAT payment by 30% was in proportioned to the increase in the Ministry's overall payments executed for the period.
