Oral Questions

- 195/2025 Hon. Hem Chand to ask the Minister for Education – Can the Minister update Parliament on the plans to have online renewal of teacher registration so teachers serving in rural and maritime schools do not have to travel to Suva to renew their registration.
- 243/2025 Hon. Viam Pillay to ask the Minister for Multi-Ethnic Affairs and Sugar Industry – Can the Minister inform Parliament on the new measures being implemented by the Fiji Sugar Corporation to enhance the fire prevention system, operational contingency planning, and disaster resilience infrastructure in all the sugar mills.
