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OFFICIAL SECRETARY'S REVIEW

This Annual Report of the Office of the President covers the period from 1st August 2021 to 31st July 2022.

A transition took place in November 2021 as the second three-year term of His Excellency Major-General (Ret'd) Jioji Konrote came to an end and Parliament appointed His Excellency Ratu Wiliame Katonivere as President and Head of State.

The Office of the President farewelled His Excellency Major-General (Ret'd) Jioji Konrote on the 11th of November 2021, and welcomed His Excellency the President Ratu Wiliame Katonivere on the 12th of November as President of the Republic of Fiji.

His Excellency Major-General (Ret'd) Konrote's presidency marked a significant period in the history of the Office of the President, notably the complete refurbishment of State House, his leadership throughout the COVID period, and the multiple investiture ceremonies that marked Fiji's 50th Anniversary of Independence.

During the challenging COVID period, a limited number of engagements were permitted and virtual communication became the norm for meetings consisting of larger clusters as experienced in 2020-2021.

Overall, the global pandemic created a more resilient workforce within the Office of the President and allowed for remote work through the use of virtual communication channels as necessary.

While the pandemic was challenging, the Office committed to ensure the President continued to deliver on his responsibilities and serve the nation, within the parameters of pandemic protocols.

The President Ratu Wiliame Katonivere traveled abroad in July to attend the XXII Commonwealth Games in Birmingham as Patron of the Fiji Association of Sports and National Olympic Committee (FASANOC). The duty travel was at the close of the 2021-2022 FY, extending into the 2022-2023 FY as the President visited members of the Republic of Fiji Military Forces and Disciplinary Services serving on peacekeeping duties in the Middle-East.

In April, State House welcomed the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Honourable David Hurley and Her Excellency Linda Hurley. The State Visit included a visit to President Katonivere's ancestral home in Naduri, Macuata, the first for a visiting Head of State. The visit included formal expressions of gratitude to His Excellency on behalf of Government, thanking His Excellency the Governor General of Australia and the Government of Australia for their assistance in renovating schools damaged during severe Tropical Cyclone Winston, and in elevating the Vuvale Partnership.

The Office continued to facilitate the President's engagements within Fiji and abroad. The Office acknowledges the continued support rendered to His Excellency and the Office of the President, from all across Government in particular the Office of the Prime Minister for direction and support.

Roles and Responsibilities

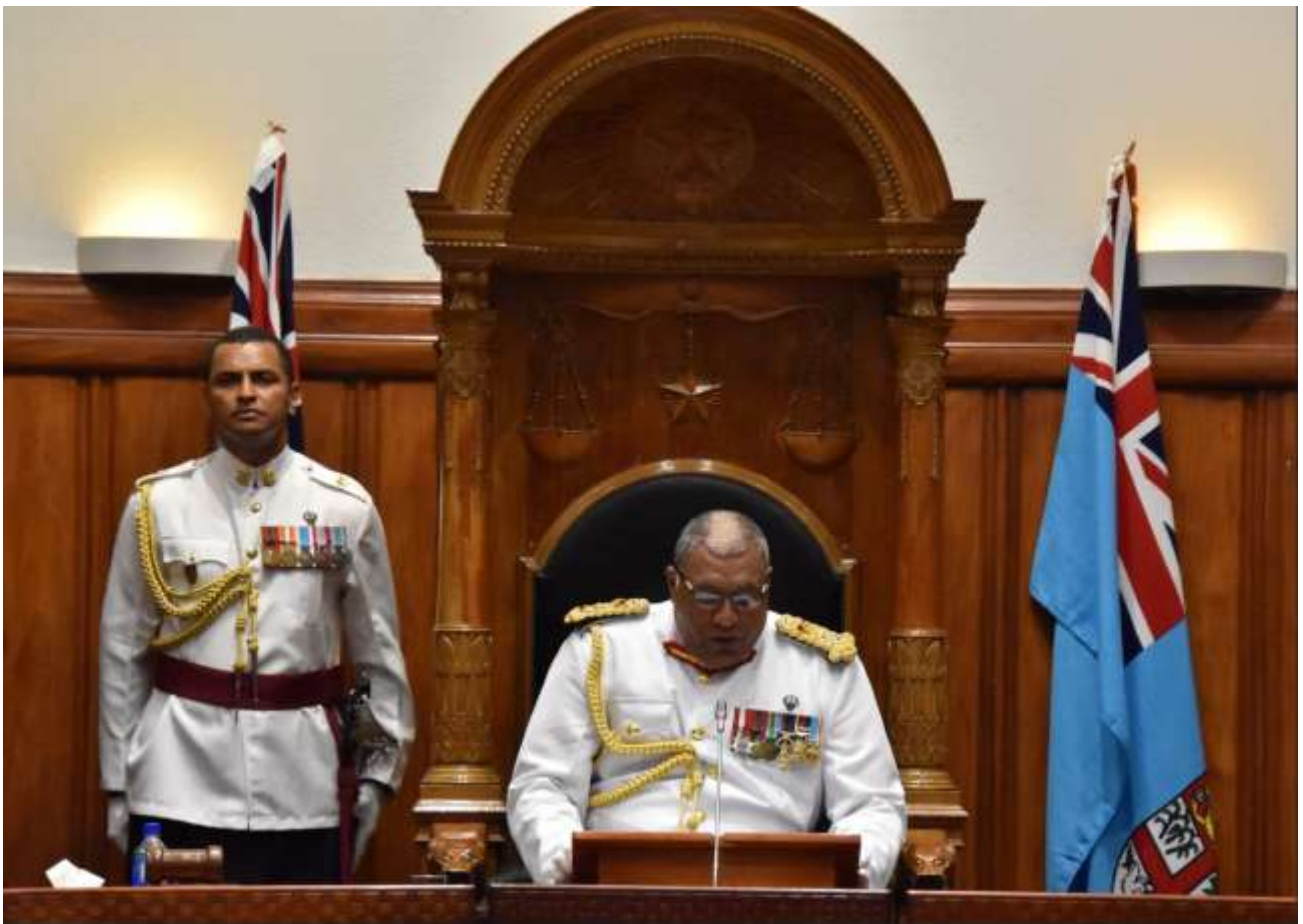
The role and responsibilities of the Office of the President are to provide support services for the effective functioning of the Office of the President in the following areas:

- To ensure that the role and functions of the President under the 2013 Constitution, and other relevant legislation are carried out effectively and efficiently.
- To provide management and service support in the maintenance of the Presidential residence and properties.
- To provide secretariat support services in the administration of Honours and Awards system in accordance with the Fiji Honours and Awards Act 1995.
- To facilitate the proper administration of the annual budgetary process and proper utilization of budgetary provision in accordance with the Financial Management Act, Finance Instructions, Public Service Act and Regulations, and the policy guidelines of Central Agencies.
- To provide security services and personal protection to the President and His Excellency's immediate family through the Republic of Fiji Military Forces and Fiji Police Force personnel on attachment with the Presidential Office

Office of the President

The President's roles and functions are governed by the Constitution. These include attendance to Constitutional roles as Head of State with Constitutional Appointments and presiding over ceremonial functions and responsibilities as Commander-in-Chief of the Republic of Fiji Military Forces. The engagements enhance and strengthen social cohesion, national security and the Rule of Law with Access to Justice.

As Head of State, the President opens the yearly Parliamentary Session and exercises executive authority on the advice of the Prime Minister and other Ministers and Constitutional bodies including the Judicial Services Commission, Constitutional Offices Commission, the Electoral Commission, and Disciplinary Tribunals for Constitutional Offices and Judicial Offices. The President also appoints the Chief Justice, Judges of the Court of Appeal, High Court, Magistrates, and Assents to Bills, passed by the legislature, the Parliament of the Republic of Fiji.

Diplomatic Relations

To strengthen Fiji's international trade base – international relations – enhance global integration and international relations

NDP 3.2.17 - Enhancing International Trade and Foreign Relations.

The President as Head of State receives the Letter of Credence of Ambassadors and High Commissioners accredited as representatives of sovereign states to the Republic of Fiji. The presentation of the diplomatic credentials to the Head of State is an essential process that is executed under the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations 1961 (which is given force of law under the Diplomatic Privileges and Immunities Act 1971), which legally authorises a country representative to formally engage in the responsibilities that he or she was appointed to serve.

The President's attendance at diplomatic functions and engagements contributes to strengthening Fiji's international and diplomatic relations. These occasions present opportunities for the President to engage with members of the Diplomatic Corps to discuss issues of regional and international interest.

In addition to honouring invitations from Diplomatic Missions, the President receives and hosts visiting Head of States, Head of Governments, Foreign Ministers or Dignitaries on Official Visit.

To honour visiting Heads of State and Royalty on official business, it is customary for the President to receive a Courtesy Call from the visiting dignitary. Additionally, a traditional welcome ceremony and State Dinner may be hosted by the Head of State.

The First Lady

Order of Fiji

To enhance the national enabling environment through portfolio leadership, cultivate appreciation and secretariat support

As per the Fiji Honours and Awards Act 1995, Section 4(2) the President is the fount of all honours and awards for Fiji.

As the Chancellor of the Order of Fiji, the President is charged with the administration of the Order, and as such advocates for broad inclusivity and the culture of appreciation.

College of Honour

The College of Honour (College) as the secretariat of the Order of Fiji provides support services in facilitating the execution of the President's role as Chancellor of the Order of Fiji.

The College is an independent body that consists of five members, who are appointed by the President and serve a two-year term. Established under the Fiji Honours and Awards Act, 1995, the members of the College consider nominations for appointments to the Order of Fiji and makes recommendations to the President.

The College organizes awareness programmes on the awards, collates and researches submissions, and advises the President on matters regarding the Fiji Honour System.

The Office of the President as the Secretariat to the College of Honour, with the members of the College, facilitated a number of investiture ceremonies to recognise the effort(s) of extraordinary Fijians and friends of Fiji who have contributed to their industry, profession or community, to humanity at large, or for acts of profound bravery.

In the 2021-2022 FY, the College of Honour together with the Office of the President coordinated five investiture ceremonies- one ceremony in the Order of Fiji and four for the awarding of the 50th Anniversary of Independence Commemorative Medal.

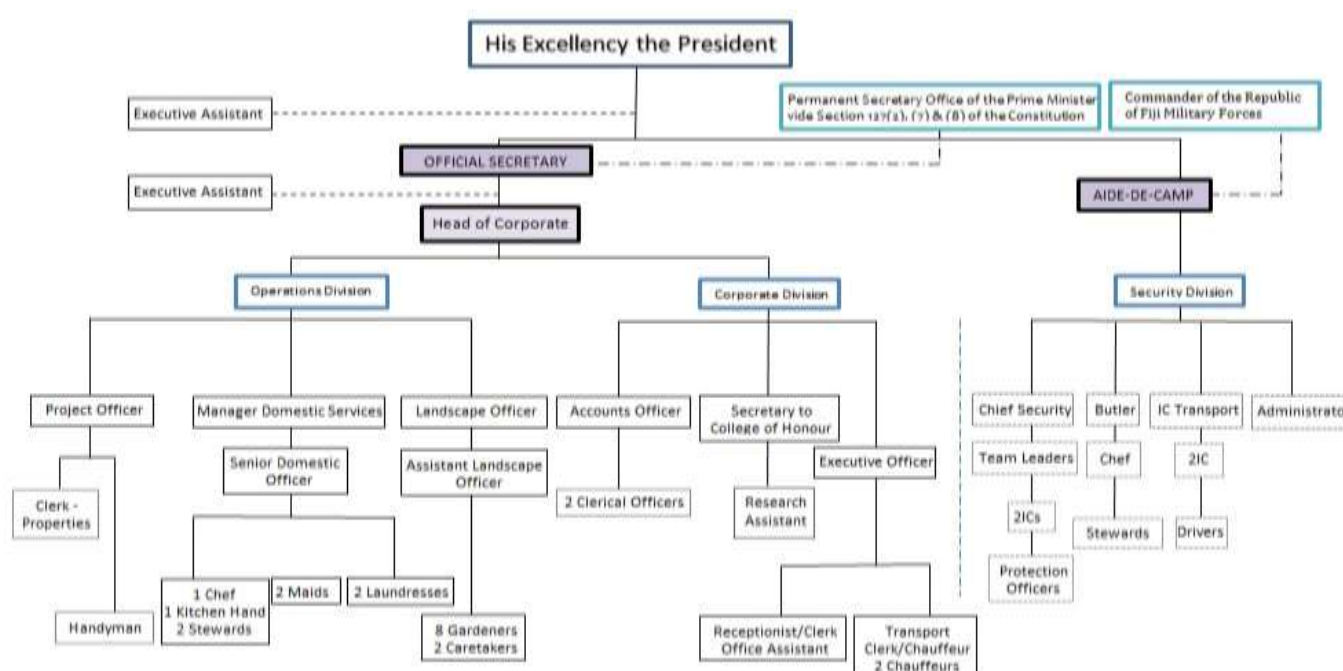
Since the 50th Anniversary of Independence special awards commenced in October 2020, the Chancellor of the Order of Fiji has acknowledged and rewarded individuals who had served selflessly and contributed immensely towards Fiji's socio-economic and political progress and development. His Excellency Mr. John Feakes, High Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Australia to Fiji was conferred the Honourary Officer of the Order of Fiji (22/07) on the occasion of his farewell call to President Katonivere. Although the Order of Fiji is intended primarily as a means of recognizing extraordinary achievement or service by Fiji citizens, it is also awarded to non-citizens as honorary appointments where the nominee(s) may have rendered outstanding service to Fiji or to humanity at large.

Two key roles of His Excellency the President were fulfilled- role as Chancellor of the Order of Fiji (16/03) and Chief Scout (2/12). Heads of State are installed as the Chief Scout upon assuming the Presidential seat, and remain Chief Scout until retirement. Once installed by the executive office of the Fiji Scouts Association, the role becomes the figurehead of the movement across the nation. The role sanctions the Chief Scout to chair annual general meetings of the Fiji Scouts Association, confer medals, and sign warrants.

Organisation Structure - Office of the President



Executive Support

The Executive Support Unit provides direct support to the President by planning, organising and managing all national and international engagements; advising on contextual matters and other issues; and preparing speeches and messages. The section also responds to all communications from stakeholders and the public at large.

Operations

The Operations arm of the Office of the President oversees all support services related to the operational arm of the Office.

The Executive Support Unit provides direct support to the President by planning, organising and managing all national and international engagements; advising on contextual matters and other issues; and preparing speeches and messages. The section also responds to all communications from stakeholders and the public at large.

This includes the Domestic Services section, which deals directly with His Excellency's and the First Family's personal welfare, the Properties Management section whose responsibilities include the upkeep of State House grounds, the Presidential properties in Taunovo and Tavakubu, as well as monitor all capital projects for the Office.

The cleanliness and beautification of the State House premises and the President properties is managed by the Landscape Unit.

Domestic Services

The Domestic Services section provides essential support to ensure the seamless operation of all domestic responsibilities pertaining to the President and the First Family, the Official Residence, official ceremonies, receptions, courtesy calls, diplomatic engagements, State Dinners, Lunches and other events hosted by the Office of the President.

A vital aspect of its role is the coordination of logistical arrangements for the President's engagements such as courtesy calls from dignitaries, government officials, stakeholders, and members of the community; farewell calls by diplomats, presentation of credentials by Heads of Missions, State dinners and receptions, swearing-in ceremonies, investiture and commissioning ceremonies and community engagements such as visits from schools, choirs, national sports teams, and *vanua* delegations.

The Domestic Section is responsible for preparing the venue including setup of furniture, sound system and floral arrangements on each occasion the President receives guests. Refreshments are prepared and served and guests attended to as required.

During the FY 2020 – 2021, the Domestic Services section attended to all household responsibilities including the provision of the following services - maid, steward, laundry, chef, butler and related domestic responsibilities.

Properties and Landscape

The 2021–2022 fiscal year marked another period of steady progress in the enhancement of infrastructure and facilities within State House estate. A key achievement was the full enclosure of the *Vakatuniloa*, significantly improving security, shelter, and functionality for official engagements.

Key renovation works were also carried out on the Quarters at Stoddart Street in Domain to accommodate the President's *Matanivanua*, and Quarters 80, which serves as the official residence of the Aide-de-Camp (ADC). These refurbishments improved living conditions, safety, and service delivery readiness, strengthening the operational environment that supports the Office of the President.

A major milestone for the year was the successful commissioning of the Taunovo Presidential Link Road by His Excellency the President, Ratu Wiliame Katonivere. This upgraded road has significantly improved accessibility, strengthened logistical efficiency, and enhanced security preparedness for presidential travel.

Landscape

Landscape enhancement works continued alongside property development. Gravel and sand were spread across previously uneven and undulated areas, followed by complete ground levelling using

a roller compactor. These works have improved the aesthetic quality, safety, and accessibility of State House grounds while setting the foundation for future beautification initiatives.

The period presented logistical and scheduling challenges due to overlapping projects, limited contractor availability, and weather-related delays affecting external works. Coordinating multiple teams within tight operational timelines required continuous oversight.

The year reinforced the importance of structured project sequencing, clear contractor coordination, and early risk identification. Integrated planning between property and landscape teams proved essential in maintaining momentum across concurrent projects.

Priority will be placed on preventive maintenance planning, completion of pending facility upgrades, and expansion of landscape rehabilitation toward more sustainable and low-maintenance designs. Strengthening inter-agency collaboration and ensuring timely resource allocation will remain central to delivering future infrastructure improvements efficiently and to the highest standard.

Corporate

The Corporate Section during the FY 2021-2022 provided corporate services including Finance and all aspects of Human Resource Management. Components of HRM including the facilitation of professional development and recruitment processes, the management of the Official fleet.

Human Resource Management

Staffing Establishment

The agency had an approved staff establishment, which included the positions of the President and the Aide-de-Camp [whose salary was paid for by the Republic of Fiji Military Forces].

The staff establishment does not include the security personnel from the Republic of Fiji Military Forces and the Fiji Police Force.

Administration

The Administration section provides general administrative support services to the Office of the President. The General responsibility of the section includes the provision of managing the office registry system, managing the IT needs of the staff in addition to the daily administrative needs of the His Excellency and the Office of the President.

An essential focus for the Administration section is that of asset management; and liaising with relevant government ministries, statutory bodies and external organisations to facilitate this.

Finance

The finance section provides financial support services to the Office of the President. The section focusses on Budget & Financial Planning & Reporting, Financial Audit, and Procurement compliance among other financial services for the Office of the President.

REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2022

Opinion

I have audited the financial statements of Office of the President (*the Office*), which comprise the Statement of Receipts and Expenditure, Appropriation Statement, Statement of Losses for the financial year ended 31 July 2022, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements of the Office of the President are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the Financial Management Act 2004 and the Finance Instructions 2010.

Basis for Opinion

I have conducted my audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISA). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the financial statements section of my report. I am independent of the Office in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Fiji and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the IESBA Code. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

The Management of the Office of the President are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the Financial Management Act 2004 and Finance Instructions 2010, and for such internal control as the Management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Office's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISA will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. 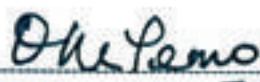

NOTE 1: REPORTING ENTITY

The Office of the President provides administrative and logistical support to the Head of State in the performance of their official duties. These duties include: the signing of Bills passed by Parliament into law, opening each session of Parliament, attending ceremonial functions, responsibility as Commander-in-Chief of the Republic of Fiji Military Forces (RFMF), conducting state visits and active community engagement programme.

His Excellency is also Fiji's lead advocate and Champion in the national campaign to promote a fit and healthy nation. The Office also facilitates the Presidents engagements with specific audiences and the general public to help reduce non-communicable diseases, a serious health crisis affecting the Fijian people.

The President promotes Fiji to the international community by formally receiving the newly appointed Foreign Head of Missions who are accredited to Fiji; receiving visiting dignitaries including Head of States, Heads of Government, and leaders of International Organisations and by visiting other countries for special occasions and to move forward Fiji's strategic foreign policy priorities.

The Office's operating budget supports the President's Constitutional functions and state visits and community engagements. It also covers the upkeep and maintenance of the presidential properties in Suva, Deuba and Lautoka and the administration of the Fijian Honours and Awards system, which aims to recognize the efforts of both Fijian citizens and non-citizens who contribute to Fiji's development as a nation.

NOTE 2: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Accounting

In accordance with Government accounting policies, the financial statements of the Office of the President is prepared on cash basis of accounting. All payments related to purchases of fixed assets have been expensed.

The financial statements are presented in accordance with the Financial Management Act and the requirements of Section 71 (1) of the Finance Instruction 2010. The preparation and presentation of a Statement of Assets and Liabilities is not required under the current Government policies, except for that of the Trade and Manufacturing Accounts.

(b) Accounting for Value Added Tax (VAT)

All income and expenses are VAT exclusive. The Office on a monthly basis takes out VAT output on total money received for expenditure from Ministry of Finance. VAT input on the other hand is claimed on payments made to the suppliers and the sub-contractors for expenses incurred.

(b) Accounting for Value Added Tax (VAT) (continued...)

The VAT payment as per the Statement of Receipts and Expenditures relates to the VAT input claimed on payments made to the suppliers and sub-contractors for expenses incurred and VAT payments to Fiji Revenue and Customs Services. Actual amount paid to Fiji Revenue and Customs Services during the year represents the difference between VAT Output and VAT Input.

c) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when the actual cash is received by the Office.

NOTE 3: SIGNIFICANT VARIATIONS

- a) The Travel and Communication cost increased by \$35,842 or 24% in 2022 compared to 2021. This is due to the COVID-19 restrictions for overseas travel and HEP not being able to travel in last financial year.
- b) The Maintenance and Operations cost increase by \$117,441 or 32% in 2022 compared to 2021. This is due to the one off cost of fitting exhibition room at State House.
- c) The Purchase of Goods & Services cost increased by \$212,680 or 34% in 2022 compared to 2021. This is due to the one-off cost in 2021 for the hosting of 18 functions for Fiji's 50th Anniversary of Independence and purchase 1,000 of commemorative medals.
