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ANNEX A

Rules of Proceedings

CONSTITUTIONAL REVIEW COMMISSION

RULES OF PROCEEDINGS

Rule 1: Statutory Basis

- 1.1 These Rules are made pursuant to the powers conferred upon the Commission under the Commissions of Inquiry Act 1946 ('Act') and any instrument of appointment issued by His Excellency the President.
- 1.2 For the purposes of these Rules, an Inquiry or Investigation conducted by the Commission is herein referenced as 'Hearing'.

Rule 2: Hearings of the Commission

- 2.1 For the purposes of discharging its mandate, the Commissioners may hold a Hearing, as and when it deems necessary to do so.
- 2.2 The Commission may conduct separate and/or simultaneous Hearings and determine the Commissioners that are assigned for each Hearing of the Commission.
- 2.3 The Commission may, where it considers it necessary for the expeditious and effective discharge of its mandate, resolve that the Commissioners conduct separate and/ or simultaneous Hearings either in person or virtually.
- 2.4 A resolution under sub-rule 2.1 shall specify—
 - (a) the place and time of each Hearing;
 - (b) the duration of such arrangement; and
 - (c) any other matter the Commission deems necessary for the efficient discharge of the Commissions mandate.

Rule 3: Composition and Leadership

- 3.1 Any Hearing conducted under these Rules shall comprise not fewer than two (2) Commissioners.
- 3.2 The Chairperson shall designate a presiding Commissioner (Team Leader) for each inquiry or investigation.
- 3.3 In the absence of the Chairperson from an Inquiry or Investigation, the designated presiding Commissioner shall exercise all procedural powers of the Chairperson under these Rules and, where applicable, under the Act.

Rule 4: Evidence

- 4.1 Any evidence lawfully received at a Hearing, shall be deemed to have been received by the Commission.
- 4.2 The Commission shall not at any time disclose, save to the President of the Republic of Fiji or by the President of the Republic of Fiji's direction, the content of any report made or to be made, or any evidence or information obtained by the Commissioners in the exercise of their powers, except such evidence or information as is received in the course of a sitting open to the Public.

Rule 5: Hearings conducted in Private or Public

- 5.1 Upon the request of a party to the Hearing, the Commission may determine whether or not a Hearing will be conducted in a closed sitting not open to the public.
- 5.2 Should any Hearing be conducted in a closed sitting, the Commissioners may determine persons who are entitled to be present and the extent of their participation.

Rule 6: Limitation on Determinations

- 6.1 No single Commissioner shall make final findings, determinations, or recommendations on behalf of the Commission.
- 6.2 All findings and recommendations shall be deliberated upon and adopted in accordance with the appointment and mandate of the Commission as reflected in Government of Fiji Gazette Vol.27 No.21 dated Friday, 27 March 2026.

Rule 7: Conduct of Consultations

- 7.1 In exercising its functions and in conducting a Hearing, a Commissioner shall be guided by—
- (a) the principles of natural justice;
 - (b) inclusivity and meaningful public participation;
 - (c) transparency and procedural fairness; and
 - (d) respect for the customs and traditions of the people of Fiji.
- 7.2 Every Commissioner shall ensure that all persons appearing before it are afforded a reasonable opportunity to present their views.

Rule 8: Record of Proceedings

- 8.1 The Commission shall keep a full and accurate record of its proceedings, including—
- (a) witness attendance and evidence given;
 - (b) documents and submissions received; and
 - (c) any rulings made on procedural matters.

- 8.2 Such records shall be transmitted to the Secretariat and form part of the official records of the Commission.

Rule 9: Coordination and Consistency

- 9.1 The Secretariat shall coordinate the activities of both teams to ensure coherence, avoid duplication and maintain a central repository of all materials.

Rule 10: Reporting to the Full Commission

- 10.1 A Team Leader shall report regularly to the full Commission on—

- (a) the consultations conducted;
- (b) the evidence received; and
- (c) emerging themes and issues.

- 10.2 The Commission shall convene as a full body at such intervals as it considers necessary to review progress and give directions.

Rule 11: Quorum for Hearing

- 11.1 The presence of not fewer than two (2) Commissioners shall constitute a valid Hearing for the purposes of consultations and evidence gathering.

- 11.2 Proceedings conducted in accordance with this Rule shall be valid and shall not be questioned on the ground only that the Commission conducted separate Hearings.

Rule 12: Reconvening as Full Commission

- 12.1 The Commission shall reconvene as a full body for—

- (a) evaluation of evidence;
- (b) deliberation on findings;
- (c) admission of evidence; and
- (d) preparation and adoption of its report.

- 12.2 The final report shall be adopted in accordance with the quorum requirements applicable to the Commission as a whole.

Rule 13: General Procedural Power

- 13.1 Subject to the Act and any other written law, the Commission may regulate its own procedure in such manner as it considers just, efficient and appropriate.
- 13.2 Any procedural direction issued by the Chairperson for the effective implementation of these Rules shall be binding on both teams.
- 13.3 These Rules may be amended from time to time as the Commission deems fit.
